Digging into God's Word & the Message Together

- 1. Choose three readers to read Luke 14:7-11, Luke 14:12-14, and Luke 14:15-24. How did you come under God's Word in the text and message this week? How did God speak to you? What did you learn or what were you reminded of in this study?
- 2. What does "philoxenia", the Greek word translated "hospitality", literally mean?
- 3. How does Jesus remind us in each of these vignettes that many of our social interactions are marked by pride? Why does generous hospitality begin with humility?
- 4. Because generous hospitality is so counter-cultural, it's also powerful and one part of a "gentle offense" for Christians seeking to reach not-yet-Christians. Why?

- 5. How does generous hospitality mirror and model the Gospel? How is the kingdom of God described in Luke 14:15-24?
- 6. What are your personal barriers that keep you from more generous hospitality? Of the 7 "ways to begin" suggestions, which one will you pursue?

7. Your Growth Group as a Family: Take stock and evaluate! How well is your Growth Group practicing hospitality with one another when you come together? Are strangers becoming friends and "family" as you gather together? Do you ever banquet or party together? Can you take your Growth Group to the next hospitality level?

8. Your Growth Group as a Servant/Missionary: What might it look like for your Growth Group to throw a party for a broader group of strangers? Who might those strangers be? What might be the excuse or occasion to throw such a party? Do you think it's possible? Will you go for it?
